

Prayer of St. Francis of Assisi

What a wonderful blessing it was having Pope Francis visit our area in late September! His visit energized, challenged and inspired us, and his message of hope touched us in a very special way.

On September 23rd at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington D.C., Pope Francis canonized the 18th-century Franciscan missionary Blessed Junipero Serra who helped found nine missions in what is now California. While the missionary is somewhat controversial due to the colonization activities of the time, his efforts to defend that native population are what helped to make him a saint. It was the first ever canonization on American soil.

The following morning, Pope Francis became the first pope ever to address a joint session of Congress. He stated that "All political activity must serve and promote the good of the human person and be based on his or her dignity". Our Holy Father chose his papal name in honor of St. Francis of Assisi, well known as the patron saint of animals. But St. Francis of Assisi is also the patron saint of ecology, so it should be no surprise that he also raised our awareness on protecting our environment.

Visiting New York on Friday September 25th, Pope Francis addressed the United Nations General Assembly, stating that the UN is called to help humanity "dispel the darkness of disorder caused by unrestrained ambitions and collective forms of selfishness". Later that day, Pope Francis visited the 9/11 Memorial, offering a prayer for the victims and their families.

We were truly blessed by the visit of our Holy Father who reminds us "Always know in your heart that God is by your side; He never abandons you! Let us never lose hope!".

His parting words before departing on September 27th:

"Dear friends, I embrace all of you in the Lord and I entrust you to the maternal care of Mary Immaculate, Patroness of the United States. I will pray for you and your families, and I ask you, please, to pray for me.

May God bless you all, God bless America!"

PRAYER FOR THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED


